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Cooperation Town

The goal is for a network of food-buying co-ops in every town across the country

Cooperation Town is a network of independent food co-ops. It was set up in 2019 to develop a new co-op model and support a new generation of food co-ops across the UK. While Cooperation Town co-ops are independently organised by their members, the network is designed to share resources and support across the movement. The vision is for a community-led food co-op on every street in every town! The Cooperation Town network is coordinated by a notfor-profit workers co-op (with the same name), which is responsible for helping groups to start and run new co-ops.

<u>Cooperation Town</u> has just launched a starter pack to help more communities set up their own food co-ops.

White poppies, first worn by the Women's Co-operative Guild in 1933, are a symbol of peace and a call to resist war. Workers from the Co-operative Wholesale Society began making white poppies and the money gathered from selling them went to help war-resisters in Europe. In 1936 the white poppy was adopted by the <u>Peace Pledge Union</u> (PPU), the oldest secular pacifist organisation in Britain, which now coordinates the initiative.

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Build back greener: Can community wealth building solve the crises of Covid and climate?

The Sheffield & Ecclesall Co-operative Society brass plaque has been added to the Principle 5 collection. Here it is against the Resource Centre window.

The society was founded in 1874 and moved into the splendid new premises in 1913 - the Arcade, Ecclesall Road.

It was demolished in 1990 to make way for the building of 'Safeway' supermarket (now Waitrose).

The Sheffield Co-operator 2020 has been well received and distribution is continuing. This newspaper was published by Sheffield Co-operative Party from 1922 until 1939. Here is an extract from a Memorandum on the initiative and development of the Sheffield Co-operative Party since its establishment in 1919 (with thanks to Sheffield City Archives).

"THE SHEFFIELD CO-OPERATOR", an eight-page journal, "Sheffield established in 1922, was completely drawn up and edited Co-operator by the Party Secretary. Advertisements were also procured by him. To maintain a monthly distribution of 30,000 copies by voluntary effort was no easy task, so periodic district Socials were organised as a means of expressing thanks and appealing for further distributors. Street lists, on a Polling District basis, covering the City, had constantly to be prepared and re-checked to ensure a scientific distribution.

> It was felt that the SHEFFIELD CO-OPERATOR did a good job of work and helped in large measure to secure Labour control of the City Council. It is interesting to note, too, that Philip Snowden, in revealing the finances of the Tory party, quoted in the House of Commons from the SHEFFIELD CO-OPERATOR.

The publication ceased at the outbreak of War. It

was substituted by a cyclostyled Bulletin, which was posted to Co-operative Party supporters. Owing to paper shortage and other war-time difficulties this eventually had to be abandoned.

Comunity Business Mutual Aid Monthly Zoom calls

This group was created in response to coronavirus, to offer solidarity, inspiration and practical peer support from community-run businesses.
