The outcome might be a pamphlet which can be shared amongst Principle 5 members and more widely. The history of co-operation is already well documented and research resources are available. However it will be useful to bring this into the context of the changing circumstances of co-operatives,

and how the co-operative legacy can be a helpful foundation for the building of a co-operative commonwealth. Sadly, poverty and social deprivation are again widespread. The benefits brought about by a strong co-operative sector and the political post-war settlement have been lost. Now is the time for all good people to come to the aid of co-operation.

Principle 5 members are welcome to take part in this project.

- The fall of the Co-operative Group
- The re-birth of co-operation
- Co-operative educational facilities
- Imagining the Co-operative Commonwealth
- Towards the Co-operative Commonwealth
- Security and accessibility of quality food the co-operative way.



Alice Honora Enfield and the elimination of profits



Alice Honora Enfield 4 January 1882 – 14 August 1935

Alice Honora Enfield became secretary of the Women's Co-operative Guild in 1922 and in the same year she welcomed the publication of The Sheffield Co-operator:

GOOD WISHES. A MESSAGE TO THE "SHEFFIELD CO-OPERATOR." From MISS ENFIELD (National Secretary, Women's Co-operative Guild). All good wishes to the "Sheffield Co-operator" for a useful and prosperous career in carrying the message of co-operation to the electors of Sheffield. The voters of this country have listened long enough to the voice of the capitalist preaching through press and Parliament the false doctrine of selfinterest and profit-making, which is destroying the world. It is time for co-operation to speak in the home and the house. May it have a strong voice in the "Sheffield Co-operator."-A. HONORA ENFIELD.

The following is an extract from A. Honora Enfield's 1927 book, "Co-operation: Its Problems and Possibilities"

There is probably no great Movement that is so little known as the Co-operative Movement. Yet there is none which has exercised a stronger attraction or called forth a greater devotion among those who have learnt to know it. It is the most profoundly revolutionary of all the workers' movements; not in the sense of seeking a violent upheaval, for force and violence are utterly alien to its spirit and hurtful to its progress, but in the sense that it means the most complete and fundamental alteration of the whole social and economic system. It abolishes profit-making, usually regarded as the indispensable motive of economic activity; it makes consumption, not production, the test of prosperity; it is gradually working out a new principle in the distribution of the world's wealth based neither on ownership of capital nor on work done, but on human needs. This great Movement, spread all over the world, has made during the last ten years* tremendous strides, and now stands as the greatest constructive effort of the workers.

The Co-op College has launched a free online course to bring the co-operative perspective into secondary and university education. Teachers and lecturers can study "Co-operative Entrepreneurship in Education: Tools and Resources" developed across five countries and available in English, Italian and Spanish.

The digital course covers co-operative concepts, skills and insights into the difference that co-operatives can make. It encourages educational institutions to collaborate with local co-operatives, giving young people experiences of the importance and efficiency of the co-operative model of operation.

A dedicated team of eight volunteers, trained by the Oral History Society, are using a podcasting platform to conduct interviews across the north of England which will become part of the national oral history collection cared for by the British Library.
