

Take home a year of Co-operative News!

When Principle 5 was given a collection of Co-operative News editions, it got an unexpected extra surprise: 31 duplicates. Co-operative News is the essential

record of our movement produced by the Co-operative Press since 1871. It provides an independent voice, not afraid to criticise when necessary.

The Co-operative Group agreed to donate their surplus annual volumes last year, to save them from disposal and retain them within the co-op movement. Each one is a large hardback book containing the newspapers from January to December, a fascinating insight into the news, views and graphic artwork of that year.

The National Co-operative Archives in Manchester holds a complete set of Cooperative News from 1871 to the present. Principle 5 holds most, but not all of Co-operative News from 1871 to the present.

138 editions of Co-op News have been indexed so far and are available on the <u>digital online index</u> of the newspaper, this is a large ongoing project, an essential tool for future historians of the co-operative movement.

In addition to the editions, held and available to read in Principle 5's archive, there are 31 volumes which are simply duplicates of certain years. They range from 1929 to 1977, spanning the war and post-war period and the height of the co-operative retail stores expansion.

The Principle 5 committee has decided that these can be made available for members to borrow, for study or discussion, (or simply to show off to friends!) Would you like to take home for a month one of these historic Co-operative News volumes? Why not see if the year of your birth is available, for example?



Two new books added to the library




Paint Your Town Red: How Preston Took Back Control and Your Town Can Too

Across the world, there is a growing recognition that a new kind of economy is needed: more democratic, less exploitative, less destructive of society and the planet. Paint Your Town Red looks at how wealth can be generated and shared at a local level through the experience of one of the main advocates of the new Democratic Economy, Matthew Brown, the driving-force behind the worldrecognized Preston Model.

Preston's success shows that the ideas of community wealth-building work in practice and have the capacity to achieve a meaningful transfer of wealth and power back to local communities.

Matthew Brown is Labour's leader of Preston City Council and a senior fellow for the Democracy Collaborative, tasked with promoting Community Wealth Building across the UK and abroad.

Rhian E. Jones is a writer, historian and author of four books on politics and popular culture. She is a founding editor of the *New Socialist* website and now edits *Red Pepper* and writes for *Tribune* magazine.



The Future We Choose is a passionate, compelling, and proactive call to change in the face of the climate crisis. Christiana Figueres and Tom Rivett-Carnac differ in their backgrounds but share a common deep concern for the future of our planet. Their perspectives are blended in this works to educate, enlighten, and encourage readers to recognise the climate emergency and act on it.

Published on 25th February 2020 just a month before the Coronavirus pandemic sent the UK, along with the rest of the world, into lockdown, this book has an even deeper significance, as it discusses a futuristic possibility of fewer cars on the road, cleaner air, community collaboration, shopping locally and home-growing vegetables, almost mirroring the dystopian reality that set in as people everywhere stayed home in fear of the virus, enjoying home cooking, baking, gardening, and where helping out others in the community became part of daily life.

Christiana Figueres was the UN Executive Secretary for Climate Change between 2010 and 2016. She was the public face of the most pivotal climate agreement in history. The Paris Agreement, in 2015.

Tom Rivett-Carnac was senior political strategist for the Paris Agreement. Together they are the co-founders of Global Optimism, an organisation focussed on creating environmental and social change, and co-hosts of the podcast <u>Outrage and Optimism</u>.

Co-operative College new Head of Business Development invites comments

Recently appointed Nina Valvi spoke to Co-operative News this month (https://www.thenews.coop/154938/topic/education/a-new-future-what-next-for-the-cooperative-college/) having started her new Co-operative College role during the lockdown. "We need to reach wider communities, recruit more members (...) and teach people why co-ops are important both now and in the future" she says. With finances are very stretched she warns about "overstretch by saying yes to everything" and sticking to core purposes. "It's important to remember that just because funding is there for a project, we don't need to go after it" she observes.

Nina welcomes comments about co-operative education and asks: "what can the cooperative movement do to support the College's future? Please have conversations with me. Tell me what your needs are. Tell me what support your co-op and your members need, what their mission and vision are and how we can help."
