### **Dr. William King**

The person who perhaps more than any other influenced and guided the early co-operatives was Dr. William King of Brighton. He was a medical doctor, Christian socialist, educator and co-operator and an active participant in the Co-operative Trading Association and Brighton Cooperative Society. Even now it is possible to read his journal, *The Co-operator*, which he published every month from 1<sup>st</sup> May 1828 to August 1830.

At the Annual Co-operative Congress held at Brighton, June, 1922, the General Publications Committee of the Co-operative Union was supported in its proposal to reprint the collected editions of '*The Co-operator*'. This was the Fifty-Fourth Co-operative Congress.

#### **Dr. William King and the Co-operator 1828-1830** Manchester: The Co-operative Union Limited, Holyoake House, Hanover Street. (1922).

Much has been written about Robert Owen who was undoubtedly a visionary, but it was King who through his writings, particularly *The Co-operator*, gave the practical advice which so influenced the nascent co-operative movement. *The Co-operator* was indispensable reading for members of the early co-operatives and was very influential in Rochdale at the pioneering stage of the cooperative movement in the 1820s, '30s & '40s.

### Tony Blair's rush for power left co-ops out in the cold, argues new study

Writing in <u>Co-operative News</u>, Dr Rita Rhodes reviews a critical history of the rise of New Labour, which points to a sidelining of co-operation.

Besides instilling ideas of self-help and mutuality into co-operative ideas, Dr William King urged steering clear of government involvement; it could possibly corrupt co-operatives' operations. This advice was followed. In the 19th century, co-ops mostly limited themselves to observing governments' legal and tax requirements. This later widened to include direct political action, and they accepted increased government direction in both world wars.

In more recent times of benefits, loans and grants, co-operatives have moved closer to government. But in this new study, Les Huckfield claims that 'under New Labour this almost killed them'.
