Worker co-op launches fruit tree nursery and heritage orchard in Sheffield

Sheffield Fruit Trees is crowdfunding to support the venture, with match funding pledged by the Forestry Commission

Worker co-op <u>Sheffield Fruit Trees</u> is fundraising to expand its work of filling the South Yorkshire city with fruit trees.

The co-op runs a fruit tree nursery which supplies allotments, councils and commercial gardens with trees, as well as donating trees to community groups and organisations.

It says it wants "Sheffield of the future to have fruit trees in every park and on every street corner", and is now embarking on a project to further that vision.

Joseph and Winifred Gales were publishers of the late 18th Century Sheffield Register. They reported with courage and integrity, and rather than pandering to the big ego's and private interests of the Sheffield elite, they reported with concern for the rights of the disempowered of Sheffield. The result was that they had to flee the country.

The author asks the question 'is it a crime to tell the truth?' That question is still relevant. Think of the journalists of today who have courage and integrity, like Carole Cadwalladr.

The Sheffield Register was succeeded by 'The Iris' published by another man of integrity, James Montgomery. His honest and fearless reporting resulted in him serving two terms in York prison.



Now is the time to re-visit the achievements of Harold Wilson in the context of the political circumstances of the times. This is an excellent biography written by a member of the current Labour shadow cabinet. Published in 2022.

In an intriguing paradox, Wilson, influenced by the distinctively democratic faith of his Yorkshire boyhood, united a fractured Labour Party, ushering in the cultural and social changes of the 'swinging sixties'. His was the government to decriminalise homosexuality, legalise abortion and abolish capital punishment. With a brilliant mind, sure-footed political moves and a feel for public opinion, he was a survivor who over and over again emerged from desperate crises – even, perhaps, conspiracies – to lead his party to victory. <u>Co-op : A Novel Of Living Together.</u> By Upton Sinclair
