The first Co-operative Society on record in Sheffield was started in 1865 at 127, Devonshire Street and its name was 'The Sheffield Improved Industrial and Provident Society.'

The Ecclesall Co-operative Society was established in 1874.

In 1907 these two societies merged to form 'The Sheffield and Ecclesall Co-operative Society' The souvenir book is an excellent resource for the story of Sheffield and Ecclesall up to the opening of new Central Premises in 1913 'The Arcade' later to be called 'Sunwin House.'

Sheffield and Ecclesall Co-operative Society Central Comrades Circle

The youth wing of the S&E Co-operative Society, known as the Circlites published a monthly journal, 'The Circle Review'. There were 22 editions in all, number one was Friday 6th June 1924 and the last came out on Friday 5th March 1926. All 22 editions have been bound in one volume which is kept at the National Cooperative Archive.

Like co-operators everywhere they were focussed on working towards the co-operative commonwealth and world socialism. They were very much in tune with the Sheffield Branch of the ILP Guild of Youth who were always given space in the The Circle Review. The Circlites were represented on the S&E Co-op Society Education Committee. Education was always considered central to the purposes of the co-operative movement.

Co-operation if it is to mean anything is a way of life with all the relationships, work, trade, culture, education, play, physical activity, sport, and all the social activities that go together to make community.

Of course, in all groups of people there will sometimes be disagreements and upset.

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The Co-operative Party

The Sheffield Co-operator was published every month from May 1922 to July 1939 by the Sheffield Co-operative Party.

With a guaranteed circulation of 30,000 copies, it reported on issues which were of interest to people in Sheffield and refuted the negative reporting from the mainstream press towards co-operatives at that time.

The complete collection of 170 editions and 13 Bulletins were bound in volumes and donated to Sheffield Libraries (Local Studies) by the Sheffield Co-operative Party.

Largely the work of one man — Albert Ballard, the Secretary of the Sheffield Co-operative Party — the Sheffield Co-operator survives as a unique example of a locally produced co-operative newspaper.
